

JDIG ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE CHECKS

DEACS staff provide technical assistance before and after a business becomes operational in North Carolina. In 2018, DEACS became responsible for Environmental Compliance Reviews (ECRs) that are performed when businesses apply for Job Development Investment Grants (JDIGs) or grants through the One North Carolina Fund (OneNC). JDIG grants are available for new and expanding companies to help offset expansion or locating costs. JDIGs are based on North Carolina Department of Commerce (NC Commerce) criteria for operation. The One NC Fund is a discretionary cash-grant allowing for quick response to job creation projects. It is based on the number of jobs created, overall level of investment, location, and economic impact for the pecified area or region.

To complete an ECP, the regional Environmental Assistance coordinator (EAC) reviews the project information such as project location, industrial processes, new or expanding an established business. The EAC then creates a compliance report for the project, and DEQ staff are contacted for historical compliance information and potential permitting needs. The EAC conducts internal database searches, as well as guerving the EPA's Enforcement and Compliance History Online database. This information is compiled, summarized and added to the final ECR report, which is shared with DEQ's Projects Liason for submission to NC Commerce.

FY 2021 AND FY 2022

In May 2022, Christine Whitmiere, the organics recycling specialist, coordinated a cafeteria food composting review for Dana Elementary in Henderson County. The school is participating in a food waste recycling program to divert compostable materials from the landfill. The two day "waste sort" field analysis engaged area volunteers including WRP's Bruce Helwig and Jan Hardin and showed that the cafeteria collection program was working well

HELPING MANUFACTURERS FIND RECYCLING MARKETS

The WRP field staff helped Jackson Paper Manufacturing a 100% corrugated paper manufacturer in Sylva, connect with Biltmore Iron and Metal (BIMCO) to recycle a papermaking residual called "rag rope." Jackson Paper now receives a small revenue for this by-product instead of paying a disposal fee. The recycling arrangement is diverting up to 2.076 tons per year from the landfill and ves more than \$80,000 in annual disposal costs.

ASSISTING LIBERTY TIRE WITH AN ENERGY ASSESSMENT

In March 2022, Liberty Tire Recycling staff contacted Waste Reduction Partners to request assistance with conducting an energy efficiency review for its Cameron site. WRP Engineer Adrian Boutwell conducted a pilot energy and water assessment and guidance report for the site to identify cost-effective efficiency and renewable energy projects. The work is helping Liberty develop environmental sustainability goals at a corporate level.

CREATING A BREWERY RECYCLING PARTNERSHIP

After meeting with a series of breweries, DEACS' Mike Greene discovered they all generate the same hard-to recycle material streams but in quantities too small to attract a recycler. In coordination with Sierra Nevada, the Western North Carolina Brewery Recycling Co-Operative was launched in April 2021 that allowed regional breweries to bring source-separated recyclable materials including plastic wrap, cardboard, polypropylene grain bags and mylar hops bags to Sonoco Recycling (formerly American



Examples of the program level logos are at the end of this paragraph. These logos vary slightly from the overall ESI program logo (above). The official program logo use is reserved for the ESI (DEQ) staff only.



ESI Steward Logos

Organizations agree to adhere to the following guidance on proper use of these logos.

The ESI program level logos:

- 1) May only be used by the organization or part of the organization recognized at that level. When using the logo, the member must make clear in its use of the logo what portion of the organization's operations (specific site or sites) are considered an Environmental Steward, Rising Steward, or Partner.
- 2) May be used on internal and external printed and electronic media. Examples of where the ESI program level logos may be used include:
 - Organization letterhead
 - Organization business cards
 - Organization signs and flags
 - · Organization advertisements and newsletters
 - Organization web site

3) May not be used by an organization terminated from the program.


- 4) May not be used by an organization to imply that it is certified by DEQ, that it is a "green" company, or that its operations do not have impacts on the environment.
- 5) May not be used by external parties such as vendors, customers/clients, boards or contractors.

Recognition of an organization as an Environmental Steward, Rising Steward, or Partner by DEO does not imply that the organization is a "green" company or that its operations do not impact the environment. This recognition instead distinguishes an organization as having made a public commitment to continuous environmental improvement. Misleading statements in the marketplace or to the general public should be avoided.

Participating organizations should distribute these guidelines to the appropriate members of their organization who will be responsible for marketing and promotion. Following the use guidelines is the responsibility of the participating organization and is essential to maintaining program credibility.

If an organization's participation in the ESI is terminated for any reason, use of the logo must cease immediately, and all related benefits are withdrawn. DEQ will periodically monitor use of the logo. Continued inappropriate use of the logo by participating organizations may result in revocation of logo use privileges or in termination of program participation.

COMPOST ONLY



<u>Eaton - Arden</u>, an ESI Steward member since 2019, was presented the Clean Air Excellence Award in November 2020 by the Western North Carolina Regional Air Quality Agency (WNCRAQA). The award gives special recognition to local businesses and organizations that have gone above and beyond air quality rules and regulations to implement voluntary, innovative programs that reduce air pollution in Western North Carolina.

Eaton – Arden is a manufacturer of power management products such as low-voltage switchgear, medium-voltage drives, automatic transfer switches, and power factor correctors. To support the plant objective to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and energy consumption, 52,000 of the 134,000-square feet of roofing was replaced in 2019. Additional insulation was added to the roof in accordance with manufacturer's recommendations to achieve R30 insulation value and reduce energy loss from the facility. In addition, two of the roof-mounted HVAC units using R-22 refrigerant were replaced with more efficient Energy Star units, using the more environmentally friendly R-410A refrigerant.

Projected annual decreases in greenhouse gas (carbon dioxide) emissions for the projects:

517,903 pounds of carbon dioxide for roofing upgrade and
 26,610 pounds of carbon dioxide for HVAC upgrade.

The facility's projected cost-savings for the roofing project when completed is \$17,239 each year. HVAC energy use and associated costs are expected to decrease by 6 percent.

DAIMLER

- <u>Daimler Trucks North America</u> (DTNA), an ESI member since 2010, has four facilities in the program that have all achieved Steward membership by 2017. The company announced that the first J.B. Hunt Intermodal delivery using the eCascadia, an all-electric Class 8 truck that pulled out of the Southgate terminal in August 2020, barely making a sound.
- With zero tailpipe emissions, the eCascadia is an environmentally friendly vehicle that can greatly reduce a fleet's carbon tootprint. On a full charge, the series-produced eCascadia is expected to have a driving range of up to 250 miles, making it ideal for local and regional distribution and drayage. The all-electric tractor has a 525-horsepower engine and can recharge as much as 80 percent in just 90 minutes.
- Charging stations have been installed at the Los Angeles terminal, and drivers are being trained to operate the vehicle. The eCascadia vehicle that J.B. Hunt uses is part of the Freightliner Customer Experience Fleet, an initiative to provide DTNA customers with first-hand experience implementing electric vehicles within their operations.





- <u>Thomas Built Buses High Point</u>, an ESI Steward since joining the program in 2011, was visited by Vice President Kamala Harris, EPA Administrator Michael Regan, and N.C. Governor Roy Cooper on April 19, 2021, as part of the Biden Administration's infrastructure plan rollout.
- A facility tour included the bus floor assembly area, automated vehicle guidance system, electric vehicle charging station and electric vehicles fleet. Thomas Built Buses had recently rolled out the new SAF-T- Liner EC2 electric school bus. Both Vice President Harris and Governor Cooper touted the electric buses as models for clean energy advancement. For more, check out this <u>sticle</u>.
- The Board of Education in Maryland's Montgomery County voted unanimously on Feb. 23, 2021 to approve a 16-year, S169 million contract to lease 326 buses that could result in the county replacing its entire 1,422bus fleet over the next two decades. The deal represents the largest municipal government order of any kind for buses and promotes clean energy use.






