Workshops

Annual Workshop and Banquet for Local Programs

The 2014 Local Programs Annual Erosion and Sedimentation Control Workshop was held on February 4-5 at Doubletree by Hilton Riverfront in New Bern, NC. There were approximately 100 participants in the event, including representatives from 50 local programs.

The workshop included more involvement on behalf of the local program representatives.
