EVERYTHING isn't recyclable. However, these six items are recyclable in most of NC: plastic bottles, jugs and jars; metal cans; paper; and cardboard. That's it! That means all of those other plastic items (pouches, cups, togo containers, etc.) are trash! #RecycleRightNC



Most plastic items have a recycling symbol on them. That is just a resin code and doesn't mean the item can be recycled. So which plastics can go in the recycling? Plastic bottles are a sure bet for the recycling bin. Rinse and toss it in the bin for the win! #RecycleRightNC

You CAN never go wrong recycling cans. Give it a rinse and pop it in the recycling bin: CAN-tastic! #RecycleRightNC



Check with your local recycling program to find out if you can pop them in your cart or if you have to take them to a drop-off site. #RecycleRightNC EVERYTHING isn't recyclable! The nine items you should always keep out are: plastic bags, food waste, cups, to-go containers, paper towels, tiny things, plastic packaging, Styrofoam and gloves/ masks. #RecycleRightNC Plastic bags wrap around the recycling machines, shutting down the facility several times a day. Take them to the grocery store; bring your own bags; and when possible, buy products that aren't packaged in plastic. #RecycleRightNC Food and liquids in the recycling bin contaminate all the other recyclables. Plus, it's gross for the people who sort your recycling. Empty and rinse containers before placing them in the recycling. Put other food waste in the compost. #RecycleRightNC Don't toss that cup in the recycling bin! Put it in the trash. These singleuse items are often



Remember: most singleuse to-go containers are trash. If it isn't a plastic bottle, tub, jug or jar, DO NOT recycle it. #RecycleRightNC



Personal protective equipment like masks and gloves aren't recyclable. They also don't belong in the parking lot or on the side of the road. Put them in the trash. #RecycleRightNC



DON'T TANGLE OR CONTAMINATE!

Paper towels, tissues and napkins are often dirty, but even when clean, they are too thin to be recycled into paper. Put them in the compost or trash. Receipts contain non-recyclable layers and chemicals. Refuse receipts or put them in the trash. #RecycleRightNC



Tiny items can't be easily sorted by recycling machines or people. Don't put paper smaller than a business card or shredded paper in the recycling cart! #RecycleRightNC



Plastic packaging wrap around the recycling machines, shutting down the facility several times a day. Take them to the grocery store; bring your own bags; and when possible, buy products that aren't packaged in plastic. #RecycleRightNC



Styrofoam doesn't belong in the recycling bin. Instead, reduce your single-use! Put it in the trash where it belongs. Don't tangle or contaminate. Recycle right for our state! #RecycleRightNC
