#21 - Beach Access recycling is collected twice per week during the summer season.

#25 - Private haulers utilize the drop off center to dispose of recyclables from ABC permit holders or commercial businesses.

#43 - Mixed glass is hauled to Dare County. White goods with refrigerant are hauled to Dare County. Electronics including TVs are collected by Dare County. Other electronics tons includes televisions. These figures are calculated by each pallet collected by Dare Co. (approximately 600 lbs per pallet). C&D listed recycled materials tonnage included concrete and asphalt materials delivered to C&D recycling facility.

#63 - Debris Removal from Tropical Storm Michael is not included in the collection and tipping fees sections of item 63. The removal of debris by contract recovery service and associated tipping fess were paid for by the Town and were reimbursed from FEMA, thus the debris removal cost and quantities are not reported in the item. Tropical Storm Michael generated 10,443 cubic yards of vegetated debris and this debris was removed at a the cost of \$111,769.20.
