Question # 44 - Comment on Special Recycling Events: The county set up 40-yard containers for the Blue Ridge Bar-B-Que Festival for recyclables. No tonnage figure was reported. (Communications with Polk County staff - DH -9-6-16).

Question # 46- Note on School Recycling: The school recycling is a part of the county drop off recycling program. Therefore, all tonnages of materials collected are shown with the other collected drop off tonnages of materials. This includes collection of OCC, mixed paper, mixed plastics, glass bottles, and metal cans. Containers placed at schools are for school use only and are not for public use (Communications with Polk County staff - DH -9-6-16).

Question # 46 - Polk originally reported 5.9 T of Other Electronics and 8.82 tons of "E-Waste and Tin" entry: The invoices that the county got from the vendor showed Tin identified under FE390 and electronic waste identified as "EW150- Low Grade E-Waste". (Communications with Polk County staff - DH -9-6-16). These were combined to 14.72 T of Other Electronics.

Question # 53-Yard waste facilities in Polk County: The county's Altamont Facility and the county Transfer Station and are under the same permit numbers (Last year's note from 9-14-2015- D. Hance)

Question 75 - White good money was spent on maintenence of the drop off area, labor, upkeep on equipment, hauling charges, white goods container leasing, and fuel charges (Communications with Polk County staff - DH -9-6-16)

Discussion of Question # 63 - Charges and fees of Polk County: The county's fee system is multi-layered and is often difficult to explain within the context of a report form. Each improved property in Polk County is charged a \$35.00 per year per household user fee on their property tax bill. This fee covers appliances, metal, waste oil and filters, batteries, electronics, lights, furniture, recyclables, antifreeze, and tires. In addition, loads of less than 400lbs of wood waste, land clearing waste and yard waste are also covered. Loads exceeding 400lbs are charged a tonnage rate of \$30.00. There is a \$45.00 per ton per trip charge for bulky wastes. (DH Note from last year's reporting 8-30-16)
