This report includes information on the recycling, landfill/solid waste and pro-rated share of the Environmental Support Division to those two other divisions. A separate report is submitted in tandem for the Sanitation Division including the tonnages collected by that division and delivered to various county and private facilities. That report includes a pro-rated share of the costs of Environmental Support Division.

Various weight estimates of liquid wastes like motor oil, vegetable oil and that of oil filters are included based on generally accepted factors: 7.5 lbs/ gallon motor oil, 7.6 lbs/gallon used cooking oil and 250 lbs/55 gallon drum oil filters. An average weight of 78 lbs per recovered mattress was used based on the weight of a queen sized mattress. All fees paid were by the piece, no weights of those recycled were kept.

Lead acid batteries weight has dropped dramatically in the past two years. There is no explanation known for that drop.

Revenue from scrap metal sales includes not only white goods but other scrap metal collected and sold by Orange County.

We believe this information is valuable for all solid waste practicioners and we provide it to the best of our ability and knowledge to be added to the overall State data base.
