Rolloff tonnage includes trash from public parks, public works and our weekly bulky waste pickup. Additionally, it includes the litter bags collected by town staff following the Zebulon Chamber of Commerce's Annual Spring Litter Cleanup.

Town of Zebulon promotes on our website and in our newsletter our free mulch giveaway to residents. This past year, approximately 10,700 cubic yards were returned to residents/farmers. The mulch is ground from the yardwaste collected through the year. We post a map and calendar for yardwaste pickup on our website and hand out copies to residents as requested. Recycling is encouraged through utility bill inserts sent to residents when possible during the year.

Town of Zebulon cooperated with the American Cancer Society to host the Relay for Life event on the front lawn of Zebulon Town Hall on May 19, 2017. The Town of Zebulon provided 10 recycling carts for the event. Town of Zebulon's Farm Fresh Market opened on April 22nd and we provided 2 recycling carts weekly for this event. The market will run until October 2017. We also provided 3 recycling carts for the Zebulon Chamber of Commerce Greater Zebulon Road Race on May 6, 2017.

On April 8, 2017, Town of Zebulon hosted a Community Recycling Day for residents and the surrounding area. We provided drop-off stations where residents delivered items such as electronics, motor oil/antifreeze, paint, tires, batteries and fluorescent lamps. We contracted with Shred Ace to shred papers and documents. Shred Ace collected 2,380 pounds of paper. During the event, staff distributed recycling literature to participants and discussed all options for future recycling of non-landfill items. Town of Zebulon staff delivered collected items to the Wake County Multi-Material Recycling Facility or the Wake County Household Hazardous Waste Facilities for proper recycling and/or disposal. Due to positive feedback from the community, Town of Zebulon will host a Community Recycling Day in Spring of 2018.
