Spring 2023 Application Round and Example Funding Scenario for Community Development Block

Grant - Infrastructure

Division of Water Infrastructure Staff Report

This report presents a <u>preliminary</u> funding scenario for the consideration of the State Water Infrastructure Authority. Subsequent updates and corrections to the application information and funding scenario (including application scores, ranking, potential funding amount, etc.) may occur and will be presented to the Authority during the meeting on July 18-19. Applications are selected for funding by the Authority during the meeting, and the Authority's selections are final.

Background

This staff report presents background information on the Spring 2023 Application Round for applications to be funded from the Community Development Block Grant Infrastructure (CDBG-I) funds. The Spring 2023 application round includes funds appropriated to Water Infrastructure Funds established in G.S. 159G. This information includes a summary of available funds and any limitation on awarding the funds, a summary of applications received, and the process staff used to apply funds in the funding scenario example presented to the State Water Infrastructure Authority (Authority). This funding round shows continuous demand that exceeds available funds.

Table 1 shows a comparison of funding requested from complete and eligible applications and the amount of funding available from the Community Development Block Grant-Infrastructure (CDBG-I) program fund.

Spring 2023 Funds Available

The following funds are available for award for the Spring 2023 Application Round:

• The Community Development Block Grant – Infrastructure (CDBG-I) is a grant fund available to low-to-moderate income (LMI) communities for water and sewer improvements.

The State of North Carolina received \$47,037,288 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) State funds for FY 2022, of which \$19,323,243 was appropriated for the CDBG-I program. The Authority awarded \$4,600,000 in FY2022 CDBG-I program funds to four local governments (and another local government with \$305,609 in FY2018 CDBG-I program funds) at the February 21, 2023 meeting. The remaining FY2022 CDBG-I balance is \$14,723,243.

Table 2 shows the current balance of unobligated / uncommitted CDBG-I Program funds.

Summary of Applications Received

Spring 2023 application round applications were due May 1, 2023. A total of 12 CDBG-I program applications were submitted during the round. A summary of the number of drinking water and wastewater applications for consideration for CDBG-I program funding by project type is shown in Table 3. Requested funding for CDBG-I projects exceeds the amount of available funds for this round.
